Once the artwork is complete, it is left to dry in the sun, ensuring its durability. To enhance its beauty, small mirrors are affixed to the design, creating a mesmerizing effect when light reflects off them. Traditionally, Lippan Art was primarily black and white, with the salty soil of the region naturally turning white upon drying. However, artisans now incorporate vibrant colors such as red, green, and blue to make their creations more visually appealing. With its intricate designs, delicate craftsmanship, and rich cultural roots, Lippan Art is more than just decoration—it is a celebration of heritage and creativity. The raised mud patterns provided natural insulation, keeping the interiors cool during scorching summers and warm during the chilly winters.
